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RESEARCH NOTES

Lucy Davenport (Hope) Dickie (Great Grandmother)

In the findings report number one, Lucy's life once she was married to Ralph Dickie was discussed, in this report Lucy's life before she was married will be explored.

Lucy Davenport Hope was born on 20 March 1898 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania to her parents George Thomas Hope¹ and Adelaide (Ada) Virginia Davenport.² The first record that Lucy was found on was the 1900 census in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on 18th Street with her parents George and Ada Hope as well as her grandmother Susanna Dupree and step grandfather Staten R Dupree.³ It appears that Lucy was given the middle name of Davenport after her mother's maiden name; which was very common place at the time to help pass down both surnames to the next generation. Ten years later, still on 18th Street in Philadelphia, Lucy, then age twelve, lived with her parents George and Ada and Ada's mother Susanna and stepfather Staten Dupree, she also had a little brother at that point, Jackson age 5 years.⁴

On 9 July 1918, Lucy D. Hope did something that not a lot of females of her time had the courage or ability to do, she enlisted in the U.S. Navy in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania at the age of 20 years.⁵ Her time in service was spent in the 4th Naval District in Philadelphia from 9 July 1918 to 4 August 1919 with the rank or grade of appointment of Yeoman 3rd class.⁶ The full military record for Lucy D. Hope has been requested from the National Archives. Although the records were request mid-April the update that was received on 14 June 2018 was that the request has been received with an estimated date of completion of 23 August 2018. Therefore, as soon as the file is received the information will be shared in the next available report. Lucy was honorably discharged on 4 August 1919 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.⁷ She filed her Veteran's Compensation Application on 23 April 1934 when she lived at 57 Storey Avenue,

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Newburyport, Massachusetts; thirty five years after she was discharged from serving in WWI in the Navy; when she was then married to Ralph Dickie and had her six minor children; Ada, Ferolyn, Claire, Ruth, Muriel, and David.⁸ To denote her veteran status Lucy (Hope) Dickie's gravestone, shown below, indicates that she was a Y3 in US Navy during WWI.⁹



It is assumed that Lucy Hope met Ralph Dickie while serving in the Navy in Philadelphia. At this point their marriage record has not been found but would have most likely happened after she was discharged in August of 1919 but before he was discharged in March of 1920 because in the 1920 US census Lucy was shown as married but living with her parents and not her husband in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.¹⁰ For information on Lucy's life after this point, reference report number one dated 15 March 2018.

George Thomas Hope and Adelaide (Ada) Virginia Davenport (2x Great Grandparents)

George Thomas Hope Jr. was born on 4 July 1871¹¹ in Stanton, New Castle County, Delaware¹² to his parents George Thomas Hope Sr. and Margret A.¹³ Preston.¹⁴ The first census record that George Jr. was found was in 1880 where he lived in Mill Creek, New Castle County,

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Delaware age seven per the report but he would have been eight or nine at the time.¹⁵ He lived there with his parents George T Hope age 44 years where he was a miller, and his mother Margret A. Hope age 43 years born in Pennsylvania, and his sister Martina R. Hope age five years.¹⁶ With the 1890 census not available for review, the next document where George Jr. was found was his marriage record to Ada V. Davenport. George T. Hope Jr. married Adelaide (Ada) Virginia Davenport on 19 March 1896 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.¹⁷ At the time of their marriage he lived at 948 Hutchinson Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and employed as a teamster, and she lived at 2234 North 18th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.¹⁸ Their marriage record did not mention the names of either sets of parents for the bride or groom.

Adelaide or Addie (Ada) Virginia Davenport was born in December 1869 in Mt. Holly, Burlington County, New Jersey, to her parents Henry Davenport and Susanna Martin.¹⁹ The first census that Ada was enumerated was in 1870 in Northampton, Burlington County, New Jersey with her parents Henry and Sue Davenport, along with her brother James age 7 and sister Lucy age 5 and Ada was 6 months old at the time.²⁰ Her father was employed as a photographer at the time with a personal estate valued at \$300.²¹ At the time of the 1880 census, Ada Davenport was ten years old and lived with her mother Susanna Davenport, age 35, Thomas Martin age 26 and Francis Martin both brothers of her mother; and they lived in Philadelphia, PA, there was no mention of Henry, her father, in the 1880 census.²² It is assumed that her older siblings were off working or married, at that point, not sure if they were still in New Jersey or back in Pennsylvania.

The first census with George Hope and Ada Davenport after they were married was in 1900 when they lived in Philadelphia, PA with Ada's mother, Susanna, and step father Staten Dupree.²³ George was listed as an express messenger and Ada was raising their one child Lucy.²⁴ Ten years later, in 1910, George and Ada still lived with her mother and step father in Philadelphia, PA and then had two children, Lucy age about 12 years and a son Jackson age five

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years.²⁵ Although on the census Ada was reported as “Achia” which was a common occurrence with the census takers to get the spellings of the names wrong.²⁶ At that time George was a motorman of a street car at the age of approximately 34 years.²⁷

By 1920, George Hope was the head of the house in Philadelphia, PA at the age of 48 years, with his wife Ada and two children Lucy and Jackson, as well as Staten Dupree his father-in-law who was then a widow at the age of sixty-eight.²⁸ Ten years later at the age of 58 years, George was still a motorman and owned his home at a value of \$4500 in Philadelphia, PA where he lived with his wife Ada, son Jackson age 25 and a chemist, grand-son Joseph Hope age 4.5 years, and grand-son Jackson Hope Jr age 1.5 years.²⁹ By 1940 George and Ada continued to live in Philadelphia, PA where he was still employed as a motorman at the age of 68 years, and their grandson Joseph Hope age 14 lived with them,³⁰ it is unknown at this time where their son Jackson was at that time.

George and Ada Hope lived out the rest of their lives in their family home on 18th Street in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, until they reached the approximate age of 90 years. After suffering from a long nine year³¹ illness of hypertensive arteriosclerotic cardiovascular disease Ada Virginia (Davenport) Hope was shot in the head by her husband George in an act of mercy on 20 March 1959.³² From the front-page article in the Washington Observer in Washington, PA on 25 March 1959, there was a lot of information about the case against George and the efforts of George’s attorney to get him released on bail in the custody of his daughter Lucy Dickie.³³ Unfortunately, Common Pleas Judge Ethan Allen Doty did not agree with the defendant’s attorney when he quoted the Pennsylvania Constitution:³⁴

“the Pennsylvania Constitution allows bail in all but capital cases where the proof is evident or the presumption of guilt is great.”

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The Assistant District Attorney Paul M. Chalfin, George's lawyer, said "the case was not necessarily one of first degree murder."³⁵ To that the judge said:

*"I am not going to be the first judge in Pennsylvania to grant bail where the facts indicate there is first degree murder. I am sympathetic, but it is not the providence here of a judge to usurp the functions of a jury."*³⁶

The detective in the case, Joseph Caruthers, testified the following:³⁷

"Mrs. Hope had been ill for nine years. Her ailments were causing her greater pain and she had begged her husband [of 62 years] to put her out of her misery. Hope, who had waited on her hand and foot, pondered her request for three days. He prayed one-night last week asking for guidance. The next morning, as she slept, he shot her in the head. He tried to kill himself then, but the gun fell from his trembling hands and the moment for suicide was past."

The court docket has been requested from the Philadelphia Courthouse, to find out what happened with George and the case, but they do not keep the old records in the courthouse, but instead in the court archives. Once they check and confirm if they have the docket or not for the case against George Hope Jr, then the information will be shared in the next available report to the family.

Adelaide (Ada) Virginia (Davenport) Hope was put to rest after her almost ninety years on 24 March 1959 in the Northwood Cemetery in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania³⁸ with her family in attendance, with the exception of her husband of sixty-four years as he was still in police custody. Eight months later, George T. Hope passed away on 16 October 1959 from pneumonia.³⁹ He passed in the Norristown State Hospital in Norristown, Montgomery County, Pennsylvania, presumably a free man as the address that was listed as his place of residence was 2243 8th Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.⁴⁰ Which is believed to be a typo and should have read 2243 18th Street, as that was the last address known from the 1940 census and their long-time residence. The informant to the death record was the hospital in which he passed so they may have just got the street name incorrect.⁴¹ George Hope was laid to rest, presumably with his wife Ada, at the Northwood Cemetery in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.⁴²

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Jacob Martin and Mary Roberts (2x Great Grandparents)

Jacob Martin was born in 1847 in Salmon River, Nova Scotia, Canada to his parents Angelo (Eli) Martin⁴³ and Mary Melanson.⁴⁴ The first Canadian census that Jacob was found in was in 1871 at the age of 23 years where he lived in Tusket, Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, as a boarder in the home of Isaac Haitfield and he worked as a ship carpenter.⁴⁵ Later that same year on 4 September 1871, Jacob Martin married Mary Ann Robbins in Yarmouth, Yarmouth County, Nova Scotia, Canada.⁴⁶

Mary Ann Robbins was born in October 1850 in Nova Scotia⁴⁷ to her parents Samuel Robbins and Mary Robbins.⁴⁸ No census records have yet been found for Mary before she was married. By 1881, Jacob and Mary Ann had begun their family while they lived in Tusket, Yarmouth County, Nova Scotia.⁴⁹ At that time Jacob was 32 years old, was listed as being English, Catholic and a ship carpenter, Mary was 29 years old also listed as English, Arthur age nine born in Nova Scotia, and Jane age one year also born in Nova Scotia.⁵⁰

From the 1900 census it was reported that Jacob and Mary immigrated with their two children from Nova Scotia to Massachusetts in 1882.⁵¹ This can be backed up from the 1883 Haverhill city directory where Jacob Martin was listed with a residence at 65 Franklin Street, Haverhill, Massachusetts and an occupation of a carpenter.⁵² In 1900, Jacob Martin lived with his family at 15 Willie Street, Haverhill, Massachusetts, where he was, at the age of fifty, a house carpenter.⁵³ Mary A. was listed as being 47 years old and having had seven children, of which four were still living.⁵⁴ At the time, the children that lived in the home with their parents were,

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Jennie (Jane) age 20 born in Nova Scotia, David A. age 13 born in Massachusetts, and Clara A. age 11 born in Massachusetts.⁵⁵ Three short years later, on 28 August 1903, at 13 Willey Street, Haverhill, Massachusetts, Jacob Martin passed away after suffering for a year with muscular rheumatism and at the end theocratic endocarditis for three weeks.⁵⁶ He was buried at St. James Cemetery in Haverhill, Massachusetts.⁵⁷

By 1910, Mary Martin, then widow at the age of 57 years, lived as the head of the house with her youngest daughter Clara then age 21 years, at 13 Willey Street, Haverhill, Massachusetts.⁵⁸ Ten years later, Mary lived with her eldest daughter Jennie and her husband Freeman Crossley still at 13 Willey Street, Haverhill, Massachusetts.⁵⁹ Mary was listed as aged 68 years and mother-in-law to the head of the house.⁶⁰ It is unclear at this time when Mary (Robbins) Martin died, but it is assumed to be after 1920 but before 1930 as she has not been found in any other census by 1930 and it is also assumed that she died in Haverhill, Massachusetts, but until her death record can be located that cannot be confirmed.

As a side note, based on the yearly Haverhill, Massachusetts city directories that were located for Jacob Martin, he lived at the following locations in Haverhill over the years:

- 1883-1887 – 65 Franklin Street
- 1889 – 128 Brickett Street
- 1891 – 128 Eighth Avenue
- 1895-1897 – Hilldale Avenue corner of Marlon
- 1898-1903 – 13 Willey Street

Since I know that you, Ferolyn, lived in Haverhill for years I thought you might get a kick out of knowing where he lived and if you lived anywhere near those locations.

George M. Hackett Jr. and Mary E. Dinsmore (2x Great Grandparents)

George McClellan Hackett was born in Dec of 1863⁶¹ in Jackson, New Hampshire to his parents George M. Hackett and Charlotte Dame.⁶² Although a search was done for his birth certificate, no record was found, but his month and year of birth are based on what was reported

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in the 1900 census. The first census that George was enumerated in was in 1870 when he was six years old and lived in Jackson, New Hampshire with his parents George and Charlotte along with his older siblings: Susan age 20, Orrin age 19, and Rosina age 17.⁶³ Ten years later, George, being the youngest of the siblings, was the only child left that lived at home with his parents at the age of 16 years, still in Jackson, New Hampshire.⁶⁴ Four years later, at the age of twenty, George M. Hackett married Mary E. Dinsmore on 25 June 1884 in Jackson, New Hampshire.⁶⁵

Mary E. Dinsmore was born in June 1866⁶⁶ in Intervale, New Hampshire to her parents Elisha Dinsmore and Laurretta Avery.⁶⁷ Although a search was done for her birth record, no record was found, but her month and year of birth are based on what was reported in the 1900 census. The first census that Mary was found in was in 1870 where she was four years old and lived in Jackson, New Hampshire with her parents Elisha and Laurretta with her younger siblings John age 2, and Nellie age 4 months, and her assumed grandparents Daniel and Mary Dinsmore.⁶⁸ Ten years later, Mary and her family were still in Jackson, New Hampshire when she was 14 years old, and had additional siblings beyond John and Nellie, being Arthur age 8, Freddie age 5, Elisha age 1.⁶⁹ Mary's assumed grandparents were also still in the home where Daniel her grandfather was listed as being a physician.⁷⁰

With the destruction of the 1890 census from the fire in Washington, D.C., the first census with George and Mary Hackett after they were married was in 1900. At some point between February 1887 and October 1888 George and Mary moved their family of six children from Jackson, New Hampshire to Fryeburg, Maine,⁷¹ because in 1900 the family lived on Main

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Street in Fryeburg, Maine where George was employed as a carpenter.⁷² Their family consisted of twin girls, Mildred M. and Gertrude M. age 14 born in New Hampshire, Christine M. age 13 born in New Hampshire, Bessie Pearl age 11 born in Maine October 1888, George R. age 11 born in Maine January 1889, and Donald E. age 1 born in Maine October 1898.⁷³ At some point over the next ten years George and Mary moved the family again, this time to Lawrence, Massachusetts where he was again employed as a carpenter.⁷⁴ At that point, only their youngest son Donald age 13 lived in the house, with the exception of one of their oldest daughters Gertrude then married with the surname of Nesbitt age 24 with her daughter Myrtle age 1 year.⁷⁵

Below is a picture of George M. Hackett and Mary E. Dinsmore.⁷⁶



By 1920, George and Mary Hackett were empty nesters and lived on Ormes Street in Lawrence, Massachusetts where he was 56 years old and a carpenter and she was 54 years old.⁷⁷ Ten years later, they had moved to 450 River Side Drive also in Lawrence, Massachusetts where

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he was employed as a carpenter still, at the age of 66 years.⁷⁸ The 1940 census was searched for but was not found for either George or Mary.

Upon request of the city of Lawrence, Massachusetts they sent the attached death certificates for both George and Mary Hackett. Unfortunately, on 26 March 1949, at their residence at 453 Riverside Drive in Methuen, Massachusetts, they died together from suffocation after an accident with the oil stove tipping over and causing a house fire.⁷⁹ They are buried together at the Elmwood Cemetery, in Methuen, Massachusetts.⁸⁰

George M. Hackett Sr. and Charlotte J. Dame (3x Great Grandparents)

George M. Hackett Sr. was born in approximately 1808 in Jackson, New Hampshire to his father Jeremiah Hackett.⁸¹ Not much is known about George before he was an adult and married. No birth record has yet to be found but his death record did indicate that his father was Jerimiah but did not list his mother. Charlotte J. Dame was born in 1818 in Jackson, New Hampshire to her parents John Dame and Mehitable Trickey.⁸² Again no birth record has yet to be found for Charlotte, but her death record did give the above information. There was also no marriage record found to date for George and Charlotte, but it was assumed that they were married in approximately 1838 or 1839 based on the age of their oldest child at ten years of age in 1850.⁸³

George and Charlotte Hackett were first found together on the 1850 US census when they lived in Jackson, New Hampshire where George was a farmer at the age of forty-two and Charlotte as thirty-two keeping house with their two children Ira age 10 years and Susan M. age 1 year old. Ten years later, they still lived in Jackson, New Hampshire with a growing family of then three children in the house, appears that their oldest son Ira had moved out by that point.⁸⁴ They did have Susan M age 10, Orin W. age 9, Rosina H age 7; also, in the home was George's father Jeremiah Hackett age 77 years.⁸⁵ Interesting to note, the census of 1860 indicated the

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value of real estate and personal estate for the head of the household. In this year it was reported that George Hackett had real estate valued at \$1325 and personal estate valued at \$800; the current day value for this worth would be \$38,782.44 and \$23,415.81.⁸⁶

Ten years later, in 1870 George and Charlotte had increased their family once again to include their youngest child, George M. age 6 years and they were all still in Jackson, New Hampshire.⁸⁷ At that point George Sr. was 62 years and a farmer, and Charlotte was 52 years keeping house with their four children, Susan age 20, Orrin age 19, Rosina age 17, and George age 6 years.⁸⁸ Over the next ten years all but George Jr. had moved out of their parents house and it was just George Sr. age 72 years still working as a farmer, Charlotte age 62 years, and George Jr. age 16 years.⁸⁹

At the age of 75 years, George M Hackett Sr. passed away on 7 December 1883 in Jackson, New Hampshire from a heart disease.⁹⁰ Five years later, Charlotte J. (Dame) Hackett passed away at the age of 70 years on 5 July 1888 in Jackson, New Hampshire.⁹¹ They were buried in plots 628 and 629 of the Jackson Village Cemetery, in Jackson, New Hampshire.⁹²

Lucy Ann (Pond) Dickie – McManus (3x Great Grandmother)

Since the time of report #1 dated 15 March 2018, additional information has been discovered for Lucy Ann (Pond) Dickie. Although no death record has yet been found for William Dickie it is assumed that he passed away prior to 1890 as this was the year that Lucy remarried, a continued effort will be made to find William's death record, but none has been found at this point. It is from this second marriage record for Lucy that a lot of information was found for her family line. Lucy Ann (Pond) Dickie married Charles McManus on 14 August 1890 in Newburyport, Massachusetts.⁹³ Their marriage record indicated the names of both parents for bride and groom. Lucy's father was Charles W. Pond and her mother was Elizabeth A. Pond.⁹⁴ From this marriage record the death record was able to be found for Lucy; as it was under her second husband's surname.

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Lucy's death record was very informative. At the time of her death she was 63 years, 7 months, and 7 days old, so she was born on 7 January 1844 in Marysville, New Brunswick, Canada, and was born to her parents Charles W. Pond and Ann Elizabeth Bradley.⁹⁵ This document also listed her maiden name of Pond and that she was a widow and husband's name was Charles McManus. Lucy Ann (Pond) Dickie McManus passed away on 14 August 1907 from pulmonary tuberculosis in Salisbury, Massachusetts that she suffered from June to August 1907.⁹⁶ Lucy was buried on 17 August 1907 in Highland Cemetery in Newburyport, Massachusetts.⁹⁷

- John Dame and Mehitable Trickey (4x Great Grandparents)
- Charles W. Pond and Elizabeth Bradley (4x Great Grandparents)
- Jeremiah Hackett and Susan (4x great grandparents) (Susan assumed based on burial plots in Jackson, NH)
- Daniel Dinsmore and Mary (4x Great Grandparents)
- James Dickey and Mary McLeod (5x Great Grandparents)
- The military records for Ralph Dickie can be obtained from NARA for a search and copying fee of \$25 for 5 pages or less, or \$70 for 6 pages or more – no way to know what charge will be until they search for records.
